Yarra Ranges Council have also offered a training course for "professional development in community engagement" to three volunteer facilitators from Warburton, Belgrave and Healesville, a most timely contribution to the launch of our project.

We also have a planning meeting ahead with Gary Slater, CEO of the Returned Servicemen's League, Healesville Sub-Branch and Melbourne Water to discuss the revegetation of the Grace Burn along the boundary of their property.

'IMPACTS ON BIODIVERSITY DURING THE ANTHROPOCENE' Annual Biodiversity Symposium 2015 The Field Naturalists Club of Victoria Inc. Since 2002, the FNCV has organised a symposium for the global Biodiversity month in September. Each Symposium focuses on a specific theme, drawn from a variety of local and international events and movements. In most cases the papers presented at the symposium have been subsequently collected and published as a special issue of the FNCV journal The Victorian Naturalist.

REVIEW OF NATIVE VEG PERMITTED CLEARING REGS

EEG'S 4TH SUCCESSFUL LEGAL CASE - YAY!

Environment East Gippsland's fourth Court case challenging the government's non-adherence to its own environment laws has been settled (17.7.15). This time it was for the owls with over 2000ha set aside for owl habitat by an agreement between EEG, DELWP and VicForests. Logging in key areas of unprotected owl habitat scheduled for clearfelling will be halted for 4 years while research is underway and 9 stands of old growth forest will be removed from the logging schedule and into protection zones.

FORESTS UPDATE:

The federal Environment Minister, Greg Hunt, has announced his Threatened Species Strategy to "halt and reverse" the decline in 20 species by 2020. Leadbeater's Possum has been selected for "Emergency Intervention" but it is not clear what this will mean on the ground. Logging is continuing in montane ash forest, against the "clear and unequivocal" advice of the Threatened Species Scientific Committee. The Victorian government is establishing an industry tackforce but regults could be 18 months away. Meanwhile it is implementing taskforce but results could be 18 months away. Meanwhile it is implementing the recommendations of the Leadbeater's Possum Advisory Group, which were compromised and ineffective.

To 'unpack' the meaning of Emergency Intervention, the Threatened Species Commissioner, Gregory Andrews, called a follow-up meeting with scientists, ENGOs, community representatives and officers of relevant government departments. It was made clear that the top priority is urgent habitat protection. Minister Hunt wants to see an Action Plan in place by the end of August.

Off Grid Solar House/Spotlighting

DRREA field trip to the 'Off grid solar house' at Little River, near Lara followed by a guided nocturnal walk later at nearby Mount Rothwell Biodiversity Park where the bushland is surrounded by a feral proof fence. Cats and foxes were removed and endangered small native marsupials were reintroduced - brown bandicoots, eastern barred bandicoots, quolls, bettongs, potoroos and rock wallabies now flourish. Transport by mini bus will cost \$20.00. The nocturnal walk will cost \$35.00. Bookings : 59682824.
