### **Facilitated Events:**

Our facilitator, Karen Garth, funded by a Council grant, organises community events for all ages - six in the last month!

#### **National Tree Day**

This highly successful morning activity with participants from across the region lead to another 800 riparian seedlings protecting the Grace Burn frontage within the Farnham Road reserve . Her report included that "new landcare memberships were an unexpected bonus from this project."

The remaining 200 tubestock were later planted by Year 9 Healesville High School students as part of their "Support Conservation Projects" program.

Other students from this program also weeded and removed stakes and bags from the advanced Grace Burn plantings within RSL grounds.

# Spotlighting at Donnelly's Weir

Another enjoyable evening walk, sighting Greater Glider and Ringtail Possums with frog and bird calls identified by Karen. Who also demonstrated the distinctive markings made by Yellow-bellied Possums on a large Manna Gum.

Karen and Jan also lead spotlighting walks for the Guides and Scouts that increase their awareness and help towards environmental badges.

#### YARRA RANGES ENVIRONMENTAL ADVISORY COMMITTEE

The Warburton Mountain Bike Trail remains a major on-going issue and YREAC recently provided evidence which reveals an even greater impact on the pristine areas of Donna Buang if trails were developed there. It was also noted that there is already a "1K Drop" at Lake Mountain, a relatively near-by area with established facilities. Dr Melanie Birtchnell, a YREAC ecologist, presented this personal, evocative video:
