### **FIRE OPERATIONS MANAGEMENT FORUMS**

The Fire Operations Plan is a three year rolling plan which seeks input from communities, Local Councils, the Country Fire Authority (CFA), industry and interest groups. The Plan outlines where DEPI intends to carry out fire prevention activities such as planned burns, hazardous tree treatment, slashing, mowing and clearing to create permanent fuel breaks. The draft plan will be available for public comment during August.

In the meantime our colleagues from the Southern Ranges Environment Alliance have organised monthly information sessions with Department of Environment and Primary Industries and Parks Victoria staff for all Yarra Ranges residents. Unfortunately there was no HEWI member available for the first of these but we hope to be able to participate at all future meetings including September 11, October 16 and November 13. #### YRC ENVIRONMENT RESTRUCTURE

The recent Environment Friends newsletter contained details of the new structure for Council's Environment Department into Parks and Environment and Strategy and Sustainability sections. Members with long memories will be aware that a previous Sustainability department was disbanded as it was considered that sustainability principles should be applied across all Council departments.

The current changes reflect the perceived need to broaden recognition of sustainability improvements, innovation and education, and includes capital works and asset management.

Volunteer groups have contact with a wide range of personnel for different projects and HEWI has expressed appreciation for this information and other articles concerning Council projects across the above divisions - such as the one below:

### YELLINGBO CONSERVATION AREA

Creation of the Yellingbo Coordination Committee was in response to the Yellingbo Investigation Final Report by the Victorian Environmental Assessment Council (VEAC) to which so many of us made detailed submissions last year. Yarra Ranges and Cardinia Councils conducted an Expressions of Interest process for membership to this Yellingbo Conservation Area Co-ordination Committee in early July.

As most of us are well aware, Yellingbo has unique biodiversity and ecological values, and establishment of this committee is an important step in improving public land and conservation outcomes in the area. The state government has established the committee to improve coordination and collaboration between land managers and other agencies involved in the management of the Yellingbo Conservation Area following the three million dollars grant received to facilitate this project.

#### **BREAKTHROUGH**

Over 300 people attended the Breakthrough 2014 National Climate Restoration Forum in late June to discuss pathways to safe climate restoration. Local, interstate and international delegates espoused their strong desire to establish a more powerful response to our climate emergency beyond current climate

The Forum articulated a new strategy paradigm, exposing science, economics, politics and social change for safe climate restoration. Many of the presentations are now available on the Breakthrough website and we have copies of some that can be emailed to anyone interested. A display on the importance of the Great Forest National Park as a local contribution to climate restoration received great interest and support from Forum participants.

July 4 was the third anniversary of the beginning of the Save Sylvia campaign,

when we became aware of VicForests plan to close Sylvia Creek Road from 18th July to the end of August 2011, for the logging of Gun Barrel coupe. Sure enough, Mountain Ash forest along Sylvia Creek Road was back under assault exactly three years and two Supreme Court hearings later. This time it is trees in Rusty (coupe 297-547-0007) that are being felled adding to the desolation on the western slopes of Mount St Leonard. This coupe extends from Leo's Foot all the way down to Sylvia Creek Road and contained over 100 hollow-bearing habitat trees before logging began. The Knitting Nannas (KNOT) quickly responded by assembling again on Sylvia Creek Road. On Tuesday July 8, there were demonstrations in the forest and also outside VicForests office in Healesville. HEWI chairman Steve Meacher has written several letters to Environment Minister Ryan Smith calling for logging in Toolangi to be halted pending implementation of the Leadbeater's Possum Advisory Group recommendations, so far without success. On a happier note a Toolangi coupe HEWI raised particular concerns about in its submission to VicForests' proposal to amend the Timber Release Plan has been withdrawn. This is the first coupe to be withdrawn since the election of the state coalition government. But we cannot afford to rest on our laurels; it was only one of 300 coupes added by the

amendment. And it could be returned to the TRP in the next year or two.



#### **ANNUAL REVEGETATION ACTIVITY**

Our second planting within the Nook area of the Grace Burn was a very special event this year. HEWI and Healesville Primary School celebrated a 15 year partnership over which time the young students have planted 15,000 seedlings! A quite amazing and inspiring contribution to waterways restoration along two degraded creeks and the Watts River. We are most grateful to the production staff from Cummins Filtration Kilsyth,

who act as encouraging buddies to the young Year 3 students. HEWI is also celebrating 25 years of advocacy and waterways protection this year, so we were delighted that the mayor, Cr Fiona McAllister could join us to make all the presentations after our barbeque lunch.
