> Thursday 29 June 6.45pm for 7.00 – 9.00pm at the Memo This month we are celebrating 20 continuous years of waterways restoration that began in 1997 with a request from Yarra Ranges Shire and Melbourne Water to revegetate the eroding banks of the 'Don Road Drain'. A terrific record but it "gets better"! HEWI also began a campaign to have this waterway recognised as the naturally occurring creek that it is, and we approached Senior Wurundjeri Elder, Aunty Joy Murphy, for a suitable aboriginal name. Aunty Joy chose Wirrup Yaluk (Blackfish Creek) which was finally acknowledged by Council this year at their January 24 meeting. Official recognition by the Registrar of Place Names was announced on April 3 so our creek should now be recorded in the new Melway Maps and all location devices!!

GO WILD FOR LIFE!

This is our theme for our Environment Day (June 5) display, in the large glass display cabinet in the Healesville Library – (the display will remain for the whole month of June!).

HEWI and Friends of Leadbeater's Possum are sharing the display based on our common advocacy for the Great Forest National Park. We are extremely fortunate to have had the guidance of Karena Goldfinch renowned for her photographic imagery. Unfortunately, Karena has had to cope with our rather poor quality photos of our numerous activities -but it will certainly be our best display ever – *thanks Karena*!

HEWI ANNUAL REVEGETATION DAY

This year we will be returning to that initial site from 20 years ago as some saplings have fallen recently, leaving spaces for infill plantings. Once again, we will welcome two Year 3 classes from Healesville Primary School, their buddy partners from Cummins Filtration and HEWI volunteers. We aim to plant 2,000 indigenous seedlings in the areas prepared by Council's Bushland staff in our usual two hours - fast workers! - after which Steve McGill from Melbourne Water will reward us with barbeque sausages and vegie burgers. This food and drinks will be served at the Picnic shelter about 12noon, so we will have to walk back – admiring previous plantings along the way! Lunch will be followed by a few presentations by our Special Guest.

Students, staff and parents became our first major partners in 2000 when Susi Sheaffe (Weber), first brought her Year 3 students to help us out. We also had a long association with Lilydale TAFE Conservation and Land management students until the Napthine Government decided that Lilydale TAFE education was superfluous. In 2010, we were approached by Cummins Filtration at Kilsyth to become our first corporate partners and how welcome they have been! Congratulation to the hundreds of volunteers who have transformed Healesville waterways with protective vegetation for the Platypus that breed in the heart of our Township.



This year's planting site is along the creek from the HICSA's fenceline towards the bridge – the boundary that faces Badger Creek Road. Gloves, hats and water are always recommended but the plants and tools will be provided by Yarra Ranges Council staff – who will also pre-dig the holes with their augers to make our plantings so much easier!

This is a fun day, so everyone is welcome – there are plenty of small tasks that would be

most helpful to the planters if you are able to join us but like me, are unable to plant.

LAUNCH OF PLASTIC BAG FREE HEALESVILLE

YELLINGBO CONSERVATION AREA and the YARRA VALLEY TRAIL

Many HEWI members might recall our support for a bike/hike trail from Lilydale to Healesville in 2006 "We strongly support the opportunity to encourage local commuting by bicycle between Healesville and Lilydale". But there were concerns about other alternatives and so our support was qualified: "HEWI urges the Shire of Yarra Ranges to direct your energies towards a practical, sustainable venture that will provide a healthy lifestyle for the majority with proven tourist potential for minimum capital outlay".

So here we are again, with disquieting evidence from the consultants for Yarra Ranges Council that the preferred trail from Healesville to Warburton will be along the highly vulnerable Yarra River, including sections that have already been assessed as Yellingbo conservation corridors. These corridors were protected following VEAC's extensive surveys and Final Recommendations to the government in 2013. Bu as we know from recent Council decisions, 'protective powers' can be watered down at the whim of Councillors and Ministers.

There were no references to a trail along the Yarra River in early Council meeting agendas but the Minutes from April 2016 included unanimous recommendations for the consultants to investigate trail construction along the Yarra River - in spite of recommendations from the <u>same consultants in their own extensive Feasibility Study</u> that the Yarra River between Yarra Glen and Healesville was NOT a feasible option.

As the consultants, Cox Architects, are also track/trail construction specialists, there would appear to be a serious conflict of interest in the current process. We are also concerned about the lack of updated information on the webpage, including the evidence of Anne Frazer and Len Milner and consequent unanimous Council recommendations at two Council meetings this year on the trail – April 26 and May 9.

Environment groups have set up our own website which will publish factual information only and include links to other relevant data. Our waterways and their associated ecological vegetation are absolutely vital to the future health of our yarra valley. www.yarrarangesconservationalliance.weebly.com

If you are concerned about possible degradation along the Yarra River buffer zones (zones created by Governments everywhere to protect vital water quality of their essential waterways), then you still have time to express your views on the Yarra Valley trail as the due date for submissions has been extended to June 2 and Councillors will consider this issue at their next Forum on June 6.

We have been privileged to enjoy such a beautiful autumn this year with just enough rain to keep our plants happy and the winter vegies emerging. On a cooler day, the warmth of the library might appeal – so we hope you will enjoy the display there of just some of our many activities, and even make a note to join us when you can!

I want to congratulate Adrian Jeffs, who produced a small gem of an iPhone film that won the Best Documentary award at the MoMo (Mobile Motion) Festival in Zurich on May 27.
