"The theme for 2015 is how the well-being of humanity, the environment and economies ultimately depends on the responsible management of the planet's natural resources. Reliable evidence is building that people are consuming far more natural resources than what the planet can sustainably provide.

Many of Earth's ecosystems are nearing critical tipping points of depletion or irreversible change, pushed by high population growth and economic development. By 2050, if current consumption and production patterns remain the same and with a rising population expected to reach 9.6 billion, we will need three planets to sustain our way of life. Living well within planetary boundaries is the most promising strategy for ensuring a healthy future"

FREE COMMUNITY EVENT 1

WALK, WATCH and WONDER! - Myrtle Gully Track

This first activity to celebrate our lead up to ENVIRONMENT DAY will begin at the Tanglefoot carpark (on Sylvia Creek Road, 10 km from Myers Creek Road) at 11am for our acknowledgement of country, introductions and an early lunch. A leisurely walk will allow us to arrive at the remnant rainforest of Wirrawilla by 3pm.

Our leaders, naturalist Jane Calder and ecologist Malcolm Calder will demonstrate the relationships of the plant communities within this Mountain Ash forest and the importance of this ecosystem on which many fauna depend – including Leadbeater's Possum which was officially designated as "critically endangered" on April 22nd.

The track is moderately difficult in parts where it descends into the rainforest gullies and as this is an area of very high rainfall the track may be waterlogged during periods of heavy rain. However, this will be a slow and safe walk of continuous discoveries as we watch and listen to Jane and Malcolm sharing their knowledge and experience of the intricate connections occurring within each different microclimate.

Suitable footwear, warm, waterproof clothing are essential. BYO lunch and water supply.

HEWI will provide tea and cake at Wirrawilla and organise a car shuttle to return drivers to Tanglefoot.

Leadbeater's Possum and Mountain Ash Forests

The Threatened Species Scientific Committee - a national panel of conservation scientists that advises Federal Environment Minister, Greg Hunt - identified the threats to the species' survival as <u>fires and timber harvesting</u> in its primary habitat of mountain ash forests. `... under future projected habitat conditions, the decline in the species' numbers over the next 18 years was estimated to be over 80%. The species would also continue to lose numbers in the years following as the Leadbeater's Possum preferred habitat of big, old trees with hollows in them would further decline until 2060..... the most effective way to prevent further decline and rebuild the population of Leadbeater's Possum is to cease timber harvesting within montane ash forests of the central highlands'.

This advice strongly supports our ongoing advocacy for the "Great Forest National Park" to encompass the Central Highlands forests that sit on Melbourne's north-east fringe.

However, as locals are well aware, new recovery programs must be designed and acted on immediately; further reviews and delays are completely unacceptable.

Australian feature-length documentary film which follows the personal story of former construction worker turned anti-fracking activist Dayne Pratzky as he responds to the expansion of the coal seam gas industry near Tara, Oueensland.

Dayne became an accidental activist when faced with the personal intrusion of gas mining on his family property. This is a personal story of his struggle against international companies who have sunk more than 30,000 'fracked' wells in Queensland alone. He and his neighbours have unwittingly become the centre of a massive industrial landscape and they have no legal right to stop mining on their land.

Dayne embarks on a journey that transforms him from conservative pigshooter to sophisticated global activist as the **Frackman**. He meets the people drawn into a battle that is crossing the ideological divide, bringing together an uncharacteristic alliance of farmers, activists and political conservatives.

Unburnable Carbon: why we need to leave fossil fuels in the ground. This new report from the Climate Council uses a 'climate budget' approach to estimate that ninety per cent of Australia's current coal reserves will need to be left in the ground for Australia to play its role in limiting warming to no more than two degrees Celsius.

BUT: David Spratt has recently completed a survey of the relevant scientific literature <u>"Recount: It's time to 'Do the math' again</u> which concludes that there is **no** carbon budget available if 2°C is considered a cap or upper boundary. Decades of procrastination mean there is no longer sufficient time for an incremental and non-disruptive reduction in emissions. The evidence demonstrates that action is necessary at a faster pace than most policy makers conceive is possible.

Another groundbreaking report reveals for the first time the true 'social cost' of our state's archaic coal-fired power stations. Hazelwood is costing us a staggering \$100 million in health damage and \$817 million in carbon emissions every year. Yallourn power station, owned by Energy Australia, is costing us about the same and the Anglesea power station emits so much sulphur dioxide that it causes around \$170 million in health problems annually.
